Wolfson Technology Projects Scheme launched

1967

The Foundation’s **Technology Projects Scheme** was a programme from the 1960s to engage industry and universities in joint development with a practical focus. It was to a considerable extent the initiative of Wolfson Trustee and government Chief Scientific Adviser, **Lord Zuckerman**. Between 1967 and 1998, some **£20 million** was committed, aiming to bridge the gap between universities and industry.

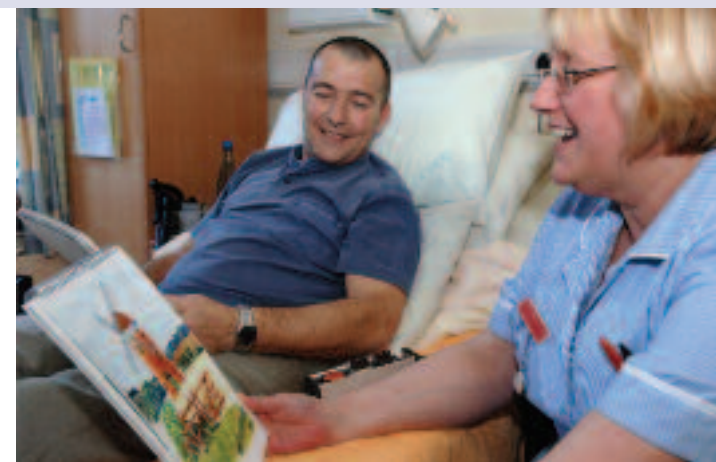

Funding of the hospice movement

Since the late 1960s the Foundation has supported the hospice movement, helping to fund the capital infrastructure underpinning the expansion of the movement with over 130 hospices supported. Since 2002 funding has also been provided for medical staff working in palliative care through a partnership with **Hospice UK**.
